

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FROM THE CHIEF:



GREYFRIAR'S BOBBY

—found on FaceBook: Scottish Genealogy's page January 14th marks the 152nd anniversary of the passing of Edinburgh's beloved pooch, Greyfriar's Bobby. The wee Skye Terrier was, reportedly, the canine companion of the Greyfriar Kirk's Sexton, James Brown. When James passed away, he was buried in the Kirkyard he had tended. Next to Brown's grave is a table monument and wee Bobby was known to take shelter there, "quarding" his master, Jock.

When wee Bobby heard the daily firing of the One O'clock Gun from the Castle, wee Bobby would head out of the Kirkyard and stop next door at Traill's Coffee House where the owners would feed him scraps.

In 1867, the city imposed a mandatory licensing for all dogs in an effort to reduce the number of strays within the city. Any dogs who were not licensed would meet an early death. This created an outrage by citizens who were fearful that wee Bobby would be euthanized since wee Bobby's master, **Jock Brown** was dead so could not purchase a license for the wee dog.

Lord Provost **William Chambers** was also the Chairman of the RSPCA. He paid for Bobby's li-

master's side within the graveyard, but also to wander the street to get his afternoon meal. Bobby's collar with the license and his bowl are on display at the Edinburgh Museum the Canongate on the Royal Mile.





Bobby was erected in the street in 1873 by **Baroness Burnett-Coutts**. The precast mold of the statue are also on display in the museum.



Just inside the Kirkyard at Greyfriars is a monument erected in memory of Bobby. People often leave sticks when they visit. The City has recently erected a more stylized area around the monument. In this case, new isn't necessarily improved.
